Levels of Meaning • Analysis Some students may not find the figurative language difficult. As they read, have students find figurative language that makes the author's tone unique. Structure If students are confused by the multiple voices in the dialogue, remind them to think about which character is speaking as they read each paragraph. 	

Recommended Placement While the Lexile level and sentence length for this selection might place it below the Grade 4-5 text complexity band, the more complex vocabulary and more challenging qualitative elements make this selection appropriately placed.
