	Preparing to Read the Text	Leveled Tasks
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Revisit strategies for using context clues to understand multiple-meaning words. Discuss the features of biography. Prompt students to adjust their reading rate in order to understand the longer sentences and weather terms in the selection. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Structure Some students may not have difficulty with the structure of the selection. Have them share ways they use the graphic sources in the selection to gain a better understanding of the text. Theme and Knowledge Demands If students are challenged by the unfamiliar weather terms in the selection, remind them to use the context and the graphic sources to understand the unknown words.

Recommended Placement Generally, the qualitative and quantitative measures suggest this text should be placed in the Grade 4–5 text complexity band, which is where both the Common Core State Standards and *Scott Foresman Reading Street* have placed it. Some students will benefit from scaffolded support for some of the longer sentences.
